## Engaging the mind-hand connection at the BoatShop

We are Gig Harbor BoatShop. You know us well as your community boatyard. You know we offer fantastic programming and authentic maritime experiences. You may even know our mission is to *perpetuate* working waterfront skills, uses, and traditions at the historic Eddon Boatyard and aboard classic vessels of Puget Sound.

But those of you who have been captivated by Gig Harbor BoatShop also know that we are about much more than wood, fasteners, putty, and paint. We are an organization with heart. We interpret a piece of heritage along a waterfront that is changing rapidly so you, your children, and their children, can develop a sense of place based on reallife experiences. In the shop and on the water, our activities promote the mind-hand connection, something that is becoming more and more fleeting with the swift advance of technology and digital devices.

We respond to vital needs in our community for hands-on creative outlets, to make tangible and relevant things, and for places to connect with others in an environment that is strictly real, as opposed to virtual reality. And it's making a difference in people's lives.

There may be no better example of this than the **Community Boat Restoration Program for Women** program. Led by Board Secretary Jaime Storkman, this group meets regularly to work on a boat repair or restoration project. Three years ago, program participant Pat Lapp walked into the BoatShop with no prior woodworking experience. That day, she picked up a piece of sandpaper and started working on a dory. Over time, the group has expanded to five women: Pat, Dawn Ellis, Lise Gagne, Cindy Hackett, and Diane Nason.

The women have tackled many notable projects, including restoring the *Avalon* wheelhouse and the Ulsh Story Pole, and working on the *Veteran* (Dawn and Diane are pictured above on the *Veteran*'s back deck).

"I love every project simply because I am learning new skills, meeting people, and contributing to the care and feeding of the BoatShop," Cindy said. "My favorites are probably the story pole and the *Veteran*, primarily because they both have an intrinsic story that reflects the history of Gig Harbor. They both have stories in the fibers of the wood that I helped clean, sand, paint, scrape, and varnish."

The projects motivate and engage the women as they learn new skills.

"It felt like a team was jelling. We kept learning new things every week and we were having fun," Diane said. "It's fun to do something different from my life's work."

As they work together, the women have formed lasting bonds with each other.

"With the BoatShop, I have found a group of women who are inclusive, caring, interested, motivated, and enjoy each other's company both in and out of the BoatShop," Pat said.

### MENTORSHIP PROGRAM LOOKS TO NEXT PROJECT

The second **Maritime Mentorship Program** (MMP) project, constructing a Gannet sailing dinghy, was completed in September. The finished Gannet was showcased at the Port Townsend Wooden Boat Festival and sold to a private buyer.

The MMP is currently preparing to commence its third project, which has received a renewed commitment from the **RPM Foundation**, as well as a gift from **Foss Maritime**. We are actively seeking the remainder of the startup costs to begin restoring a 1941 16' Chris-Craft under the tutelage of project leader Bruce Bronson.

The MMP provides paid internships for young adults in a unique one-onone student/mentor environment. Interns benefit from hands-on training and real-world experiences that are designed to provide an introduction to maritime trades and to help foster an appreciation for the art of boatbuilding and boat restoration and repair.

# Veteran Excursions Educate and Enchant Passengers

Programming aboard *Veteran* has commenced! Community members first had the opportunity to "meet" *Veteran* during a series of dockside tours in May and June. Beginning this fall, *Veteran* offerings expanded to include several maritime heritage excursions.

**Fish Stories**, a four-hour cruise to local fishing grounds to observe Gig Harbor's commercial purse seine fleet fishing for chum salmon, frequently sold out. Coast Guardlicensed skippers with purse seine experience led the trips and provided commentary on fishing techniques and history.

"What a unique opportunity to learn about the Gig Harbor fishing boats and heritage," said passengers Chic and Mary Murray. "The *Veteran* is a treasure."

**Sound Stories** is a four-hour excursion led by a Puget Sound Pilot or a Commercial Fishing Skipper. Passengers visit Commencement Bay and are regaled with stories of local maritime history and tales of today's Puget Sound shipping and port realities.

Front-and-center seats for the start of the November 18 Le Mans sailboat race in Gig Harbor were offered while enjoying **Break**-



fast on the *Veteran*. The historic vessel is also available for private custom charters. Watch for additional programming to be developed in the future.

## BoatShop Team Wins Edensaw Boatbuilding Challenge

A HUGE congratulations to the Gig Harbor BoatShop team, which won the **Edensaw Boatbuilding Challenge** at the Port Townsend Wooden Boat Festival. Team members Tony Cox, Nigel Davey, Rick Meyers, and Will Smallwood, led by the BoatShop's resident boatwright Tom Regan, built the *PUG*, a 6'-6'' lapstrake pram.

The BoatShop team faced stiff competition in the challenge, which entailed constructing a vessel from the ground up over the course of 32 hours (spread over three days). After the "tools down" time was called, each boat participated in a short row to demonstrate its seaworthiness. Judges awarded the *PUG* first place in the competition based on criteria like originality, design, workmanship, performance, aesthetic, and seaworthiness, as well as the builders' teamwork. This year was Gig Harbor BoatShop's first time participating in the Challenge.

The winning team began prepping for the competition in February. After lofting, they built a half-size then a full-scale prototype at the BoatShop, with efforts focused on speeding up construction while reducing errors in order to maximize performance during the competition. Fun fact: originally *Pugwash* was considered for the name, after an old English television show. Team members decided to shorten the name to *PUG* when they realized that, much like the dog of the same moniker, the boat design is "short and tubby with a flat nose and butt that looked really, really cute."

Longtime **Family Boat Building** supporter **Edensaw Woods** sponsored the competition and awarded the BoatShop a \$1,500 gift certificate.

In addition, the BoatShop's 1926 historic purse seiner *Veteran* was accepted into the Festival. Skipper Mike Skrivanich and volunteers Dawn Ellis, David Gaffney, Lise Gagne, Cindy Hackett, Pat Lapp, John McMillan, Diane Nason, Bruce Smith, Jaime Storkman, and others spent countless hours during the summer preparing *Veteran* for the show. Their hard work paid off, as the boat literally gleamed while approximately 40 festivalgoers per hour boarded *Veteran* dockside and learned more about her story.

The completed Gannet sailing dinghy, the product of the **Maritime Mentorship Program** and the **Community Boat Restoration Program**, was also displayed at the Festival.

### MARINE RAILWAYS CAMPAIGN UPDATE



We have reached over 50% of the Phase I fundraising goal.

Marine Rail-The ways Capital Campaign to fund the marine railways reconstruction at Eddon Boatyard is underway. Thanks to your generous donations, we have raised over 50% of the estimated Phase I project cost.

The marine railway system is the final unfunded component of the holistic Eddon Boatyard site restoration, and is identified as the highest capital priority in the BoatShop's Strategic Plan 2017-2021. When completed, this key facility will enable the BoatShop to move boats in and out of the water for repair, programming, and other projects.

We have raised over \$45,000 for Phase I (completing the outside railways), including а \$35,000 gift from the City of Gig Harbor.

The project is anticipated to be phased. Construction for Phase I will begin as soon as funds are available, with phases II and III (completing the inside carriage and outside carriage, respectively) to follow.
